A God of Restoration

New things do not need restoration. We restore things which have been used, weathered, worn down, or have broken down. God is in the restoration business. God restores lives, families, dreams, and futures. To be in need of restoration is not a failure, it is evidence of a journey.

Psalm 23:3 (NIV®)

He restores my soul. He guides me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

Revelation 21:5 (NIV®)

He who was seated on the throne said, "I am making everything new!" Then he said, "Write this down, for these words are trustworthy and true."

2 Corinthians 5:17 (NIV®)

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!

2. Describe a time in your life when you witnessed God's restoration.
3. Let's Pray: Almost everyone is aware of a need for restoration, for themselves or others. Make a list of "restoration projects" and someone pray, inviting God to begin the work that only He can accomplish.

1 Peter 4:9 (NIV®)

Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling.

Acts 2:46–47 (NIV®)

Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. **They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts,** ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

5. How has the hospitality of others shaped your faith? explain
6. What is the most difficult aspect of inviting someone into your home?
7. Discuss ways you can implement a “hospitality plan”. Let’s not just talk about our faith, “Let’s Eat”.

Prayer

1. Everyone can express thanks for kindness and hospitality they have received.

For example:

“Heavenly Father, thank you for the Paschal family that opened their home to us when we had just arrived in Tennessee.”

2. A closing prayer of invitation:
